# **PROFILE**

Founded around 2000, the BLA is an armed separatist group advocating for an independent Baloch state. Operating primarily in southwestern Pakistan, the group's ideology is ethno-nationalist rather than religiously motivated. Its struggle stems from long-standing grievances against the Pakistani government, including perceived economic exploitation, political marginalization, and alleged human rights abuses against the Baloch population. The group also opposes persistent military operations in Balochistan, the exploitation of the region's rich natural resources without equitable local benefit, and the perceived disproportionate allocation of resources to Chinese-backed projects, particularly those associated with the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor and Beijing's Belt and Road Initiative.

# **GOALS/ TARGETS**

#### Goals:

- 1. Expel the Pakistani military
- 2. Establish a Baloch state across parts of Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Iran
- 3. Eliminate foreign (especially Chinese) influence

Targets: Security forces and law enforcement (~65% of attacks in 2023); government infrastructure; non-Baloch workers and settlers (Chinese workers involved in mega projects); political leaders and candidates, particularly before the February 8, 2024, elections

### OPERATIONAL DYNAMICS

**Recruitment Tactics**: Use social media to attract new members; highlight stories of 'martyrs'; exploit Baloch nationalist sentiments; target economically disadvantaged Baloch youth; capitalize on perceived injustices, including heavy-handed actions by Pakistani security forces and political marginalization of Baloch people

**Terror Tactics/ Weaponry**: Employ guerrilla warfare tactics, including IED attacks, assassinations, and suicide bombings via the "Majeed Brigade" (has both male and female operatives); utilize seized U.S. military equipment left in Afghanistan in 2021 that was transferred across the Pakistani border

**Financing**: Engages in cross-border smuggling operations, extortion of businesses and individuals, and kidnapping for ransom; receives financial support from global Baloch diaspora

## **STRUCTURE**

Size: Experts estimate "several thousand" fighters

**Structure:** BLA split in 2017 leading to two factions - one associated with Hyrbyair Marri and the other led by Bashir Zeb (more active faction); operates with centralized strategic leadership overseeing semi-autonomous regional commands; leadership increasingly comprised of educated, middle-class youth rather than traditional tribal leaders

Allies: Members of the BRAS alliance (the Balochistan Liberation Front, Baloch Republican Guard, Baloch Republican Army, and Sindhudesh Revolutionary Army); allegedly supported by India (denied by India)

# THREAT ANALYSIS

The BLA presents an escalating security threat in Pakistan, conducting increasingly frequent and sophisticated attacks that endanger civilians and disrupt governance and economic activities, particularly the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor. Recent high-profile incidents showcase the group's growing operational capabilities and expanding reach beyond its traditional stronghold in Balochistan province. This intensifying insurgency not only threatens Pakistan's internal stability but also risks disrupting crucial economic initiatives and affecting wider regional security. Additionally, persistent allegations of foreign support for Baloch separatists, though unconfirmed, risk exacerbating already strained regional relations, especially between India and Pakistan. The BLA is officially considered a terrorist group by Pakistan, China, the European Union, Russia, the United Kingdom, and the United States (the US classifies the BLA as a Specially Designated Global Terrorist entity, although it does not appear on the Foreign Terrorist Organization or FTO list).



### RECENT & NOTABLE ATTACKS

- » November 2024: The BLA conducted a suicide bombing at a railway station in Quetta, Balochistan, targeting military personnel among around 100 civilians on the platform. The explosion killed at least 26 people, including soldiers and railway employees, and injured more than 60 others.
- October 2024: The BLA conducted a bombing attack near Karachi's Jinnah International Airport in Pakistan, targeting a convoy of Chinese workers from Port Qasim Electric Power Company. Motivated by opposition to Chinese investments and presence in Pakistan, the attack involved a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device using an oil tanker truck. The explosion killed two Chinese nationals and injured at least ten other people, including one Chinese citizen, while damaging multiple vehicles in the vicinity.
- » August 2024: The BLA carried out a series of coordinated attacks across Balochistan province over the course of two days, using firearms and explosives. Targeting military installations, police stations, highways, and railroads, the attacks led to the deaths of over 70 people, including 14 security personnel, 21 militants, and numerous civilians. The assaults also resulted in at least 10 vehicles being set on fire and damage to railway lines and a bridge.
- » May 2024: BLA militants opened fire in a barbershop in Gwadar, Balochistan, killing seven barbers. The attack was aimed at non-Baloch individuals working in the region, particularly those from other provinces of Pakistan, highlighting the BLA's strategy of targeting civilians to discourage non-locals from settling or working in Balochistan.
- » April 2024: Armed BLA militants ambushed a passenger bus in Nushki District, Balochistan, Pakistan, killing nine passengers. The attackers specifically targeted individuals from Punjab, reflecting the BLA's view that the Punjabidominated central government of Pakistan unfairly exploits Balochistan's vast natural resources.
- » March 2024: Eight armed BLA attackers stormed the Gwadar Port Authority complex in Balochistan, targeting the Chinese-funded China-Pakistan Economic Corridor development project. All eight attackers were killed by security forces before they could inflict significant damage.
- » November 2022: BLA militants stormed the Pearl Continental Hotel in Gwadar, Pakistan, targeting Chinese nationals and other foreigners. The attack resulted in at least five deaths, including hotel staff and security personnel.
- » April 2022: In a significant shift in tactics, the BLA conducted its first female suicide bombing at Karachi University. The 31-year-old mother targeted a van carrying Chinese nationals, killing three Chinese teachers and their Pakistani driver.
- » July 2020: In an attempt to disrupt Pakistan's economy and target high-profile locations, BLA gunmen stormed the Pakistan Stock Exchange compound in Karachi. Armed with hand grenades and firearms, the attackers killed four people—three private security guards and a police officer—and wounded at least seven others, though they were killed by security forces before entering the main compound.
- » December 2018: BLA militants armed with guns and a suicide vest attempted to storm the Chinese consulate in Karachi in an effort to undermine Pakistan-China economic and strategic cooperation. The hour-long shootout between police and militants resulted in at least seven deaths, including three militants, two policemen, and two Pakistani civilians, though the attackers were unable to breach the consulate.
